In the stories that we heard from immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees, there was so much sadness and so many disheartening moments, but there was also this undercurrent of faithfulness in God and kindness and generosity from strangers. It was truly a mountain top experience and I am looking forward to taking a group on another trip.

Then we returned and the reality of the pandemic hit us. The council was swift in prioritizing the health and well-being of the congregation and by the weekend Pastor Andrew and I had set up a rudimentary live stream for worship. That week was a scramble to say the least. In the midst of this transition, you faithfully tuned in online and on the radio, we got to work with Pastor Bre and Pastor Stacy, and we were eventually blessed with the wisdom and guidance of Dan Zini from NMU to develop a more reliable and better-quality streaming system.

As we journeyed through each month we slowly added back some of our routines in our lives together: Bible study, Holden Evening Prayer, VBS, Sunday School, book studies, the 21-day Racial Equity Challenge, meetings on Zoom, and fellowship on the phone. These were beautiful moments of connection where I felt the spark of our faith life together. But it has not been an easy year because there has been sadness and despair in every case of COVID and every person lost to the disease. Yet, even in the suffering I am reminded when I hear the preface to the Lord's prayer, 'gathered into one by the Holy Spirit', that though we are physically apart, we are always one in Christ.

So, as I write to you, I feel a mixture of grief at the loss of what we had hoped last year would be, but an abiding faith in Christ's work in this community that has brought us together and will continue to cast us forward into the next year.

Here is a list of some highlights of 2020:

- A group, including both pastors, went to New Mexico, Texas, and Mexico as part of a learning experience with Border Servant Corps. It was a powerful experience for those who went and we still look forward to sharing the experience with the rest of the congregation. It was educational, emotional, spiritual, and built relationships. We look forward to the sharing and to having a new group go in 2022.
- We tumbled head first into livestreaming. It wasn't always pretty (thanks for bearing with us!), but we have now moved to a level of professional cameras, audio, and streaming equipment that will help carry us into the future. In fact, it's helped us reach over 1000 people on a given Sunday! With the radio broadcast added, our worship continues to be a ministry to our community locally and beyond!
- We worshiped in the park, on the beach, and in our homes. We saw each other from a distance and rejoiced in community. And, when we've been apart, we've been together with phone calls, cards, and connecting online. Thank you for continuing to be the church for one another!
- We all got to get creative! With a virtual Vacation Bible School and Sunday School, with story times and cards. Both pastors learned new stories and shared some favorites, too. And the creativity wasn't just for kids we hosted book studies and Bible studies, started a podcast and, with the help of Messiah's publicity team, launched a new website (check it out! messiahlutheranmqt.org)!
- We did a 21-day Racial Equity Challenge together. We stretched, learned, and grew in so many ways, and know that we have more work to do as we seek to be a truly welcoming and inclusive community.
- We were generous! On Giving Tuesday we received more than \$21,000 in donations to support the work of our Community Assistance Fund and in offering a matching donation of up to \$20,000, our congregation has helped Room at the Inn raise over \$40,000 for their shelter project. That's above and beyond helping assure a steady financial footing for our congregational budget during this challenging time. Thank you!

Staff Reflections

Happy New Year! I for one, am happy to see each new year, to see what it brings for my family, my children & my church. But I must say, I was really surprised when March 2020 came and brought along with it a pandemic. This is where life shifted, for everyone. We all had a 'new' normal and it wasn't very normal. Wearing masks & no hugging! We could not imagine.

Here we are ten months later, still living that way. I can say we have had great leadership here at Messiah to get us into and through this pandemic. Our pastors have been thinking of things to do for our members, that will keep them involved & engaged. They are thinking outside the box. You really have to in this situation.

No one knows what will come from our COVID-19 pandemic. Our pastors have always kept our members health & well-being as their top priority. I have gone from printing 300 bulletins each week and having lots of folks walk in for a variety of reasons to having shorter office hours, only one exterior door unlocked, having everyone sign in when they enter the building & spending a lot more time on the phone with people & emailing a bunch. Early in the year, people were welcome at Messiah at any time, now at the end of the year, they almost have to be scheduled to come in. During this time, we are now printing 30 bulletins. Much more time is spent on the phone and mailing things to people, a very different world. Even though we are not worshipping together, in-person, we are still very busy in this office, busy in a very different way. Our community assistance appointments have been over the phone instead of in-person since June. From March until June, we were unable to assist anyone.

In 2020, we had held off on sending any quilts or kits to Lutheran World Relief, but after seeing a post on Facebook from Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp about them being a holding spot for LWR donations, we decided to gather what we had and send it along to FLLC. Wow! So I coordinated a U-Haul and some volunteers to help load the truck at Messiah (Kate Sromalski & her son Bryan, Phil & Nancy Hoover, Jeff Dodge & Jamie Dodge), drive the truck to FLLC and unload the truck at FLLC (Phil & Nancy Hoover, Jeff Dodge & Jamie Dodge).

In the fall of 2020, we started talking about Giving Tuesday and what to do... do we hold this event? Can we do that with masks & social distancing? Do we skip this event this year? If we skip it in 2020, we would have severely depleted our funds for our Community Assistance Fund, then we would not be able to help those in need, in our community... Lots of questions, lots of small group discussions as to 'can we make it work?' If so, how? With help from a few Messiah volunteers & limited staff, we pulled it off. And you, YOU came in and contributed to this fund and made it our BEST Giving Tuesday since we started! Amazing! We made over \$21,000 which will help us get through the year to help those in our community. Thank you! And you even got a boxed lunch from Subway. We had financial help from a Messiah member (who is also a Thrivent member) who applied for a Thrivent Action Team grant to help off-set the cost of the lunches. No one could linger around this year, no jazzy holiday music by wonderful musicians, no visiting with your church friends and no crafts, just in & out with a lunch to go. But you did this, you know the importance of this mission to Messiah. Thank you!!

We saw this pattern throughout the pandemic, normally we would do this, but this year, it will have

to be different. We were able to hold Bible Sunday at one of our Presque Isle worship services. Confirmation was put on hold until the fall of 2021. Also we were unable to recognize baptisms from the past year on Baptism of our Lord Sunday. These will be remembered on that day next year. With this new year, we will have the ability to get vaccinated. We are all so grateful. That will help us to get back to what we are all craving to do, spend time with one another and our loved ones. And when this is all over, there will be many things that we will continue to do that we had discovered to do during the pandemic.

People are fighting every day for racial justice, for our democracy, for the health of our planet. People are risking their own lives to bring healing and comfort to the sick. People at Messiah continue to reach out to their church friends through phone calls, notes, safe outdoor get-togethers and more to remind them that we are not alone. Our pastors continually remind us that as Christians we live in hope because Jesus, the light of the world, has come to us and that no darkness can overcome this light. I am thankful for all the ways my pastors and church family have ministered to me this past year. What a gift it has been for me to work with such wonderful people and to be part of this congregation. Thank you.

The months of January and February 2020 seem like an eternity ago! Some of my tasks during those months were: compiling the 2019 annual report and planning the potluck for the annual meeting on February 2, helping with the planning for Pastor Breanne Kinnunen's installation/reception as Lutheran Campus Ministry pastor on Sunday February 16, and getting the church kitchen ready for its annual inspection by the Marquette County Health Department on Wednesday February 5. Jill Luoma, Clare Sauer and I organized groups to prepare and serve the Lenten meals (many of which ended up being cancelled because of our church shutdown in mid March).

Once our council decided the Messiah building needed to be closed, I gradually transitioned into working from home. A few big pieces of my job such as scheduling volunteers and overseeing the kitchen will not even be necessary until we have opened up for in-person worship again. During this time I've focused more on tasks related to publicity and outreach. I had more time to add new content to Messiah's Facebook page and to our Messiah Family and Friends page, a Facebook group started after Messiah's shutdown where all members can post and share. Messiah now has Zoom accounts for its groups and committees to use for meetings so Nancy Hoover and I have shared the responsibility of hosting these meetings and teaching Zoom to others.

Messiah's office has transitioned to tithe.ly for its financial and membership databases and for our new website. This fall our publicity team of the pastors, Kurt Mensching, Emily Fitzpatrick and me worked via Zoom to design and launch this website which went live in early December (check it out if you haven't already done so). This website has given us new ways to reach out to Messiah and community members through its newsletter features so I've been experimenting with the best ways of putting this option to use.

In addition to the publicity team, I continue to serve on the Global Mission and AMMPARO teams. I assisted Pastor Molly in our fall Sunday School program recruiting volunteers and getting materials to families--and even trying my hand at presenting a video Sunday School lesson. (I continue to appreciate the skills of our pastors in using video as they've presented their Bible studies, storytimes and more through this format--I know my skill sets don't line up as well in this area but I'm willing to try again if necessary!) I have also continued to fill in for Jen in the office whenever needed and it's been wonderful to connect with you in person that way! I miss you all, and it will be wonderful to be together in person once it is safe to do so.

I want to add my thanks to those of our pastors and office staff for the way you came through on Giving Tuesday, making it our best year ever for contributions to Messiah's financial assistance program. In a year of hardship and loss, you have not forgotten to care for the lonely, the ill and the poor. You are truly living out our mission of seeking to answer God's call to love.

- +Nov=We offered Zoom connection on Thursday evenings & held a drive-by/walk-by/bike-by Advent and Finals Week care package give away with our Methodist friends at Common Grounds before an extended break from Nov-Jan.
- +28 students attended one or more LCM activities or had coffee, dinner, or a chat with Pastor Bre this past year.

2020 Report to Association Congregations

2020 was a year to remember! Your congregations have been in our prayers as you have weathered the challenges and continued to shine Christ's light in the world. As plentiful as the struggles have been, God has remained faithful, and we have found ways to celebrate our 90th year of outdoor ministry in this place of grace. Here are the highlights:

Program--We were able to host a few successful events in the early months of 2020, including our largest ever Winter Wonderland Retreat, a new Winter Wellness Retreat, and the continuation of our regular Senior Days. 2020 also brought the first summer in our 90 years where we were not able to host summer campers due to concerns around the COVID-19 pandemic. Our board and staff were early adopters of the mitigation strategies, thus allowing us to pivot into other ways of doing ministry. Our Fortune Lake community stayed connected through virtual programming including two live campfires, weekly devotions, online arts & craft and outdoor activities, and even a virtual talent show!

Rentals--We reopened our site to family and small group rentals beginning in early July. Individuals and small groups were able to take in the beauty of God's creation in a safe, outdoor environment while providing their own meals. Although we couldn't make up the loss from the guests we had anticipated, those who rented our facilities left refreshed and grateful for the opportunity to vacation on Fortune Lake.

Property--As part of our 90th anniversary year, we had begun raising significant funds (\$212k) to rehabilitate the duplexes, our highest use cabins. Once the pandemic hit, our skilled facility manager, Chris Nocerini, was able to refocus his energy on the renovation of the first of the duplexes, Spruce cabin. Thus far, the roof and soffits, boiler, and decks have been replaced with plans to finish the rest and fundraise for the other two buildings when deemed appropriate. Additionally, significant excavation and interior work was done on the camp house to improve drainage and replace lower level flooring.

Financials--Although the cancellations of summer camp and countless other rental contracts were difficult, we held our own financially due to strict conservation by the staff and the board, the reception of Payroll Protection Program funds, and mostly due to the generosity of Fortune Lake's supporters--YOU! Thank you! Our annual Fall Fest was held virtually and brought in over \$18k! Thank you Sisters of the Cloth! We finished the year in the black and were able to sock away some money at the end of the year to get us through the dry winter months. Your generosity allows us to continue to reach people with the love of Christ in creative ways!

Staffing--2020 brought the hiring of a new position, Hospitality Coordinator. Unfortunately, that new hire has been laid off since early in the pandemic. We also saw the retirement of Mary Ryan, our Office Manager, who served us faithfully but is now residing permanently in Florida. Deborah Hansen has filled that position and is serving with expertise and grace.

Hope for the Future--We are preparing to offer a scaled down version of summer camp with smaller capacities and a greater emphasis in cabin groups. Although there are some programs that will need to wait (congregational day camps, Victory camp, and speciality camps), we are anxious to welcome campers and summer staff back and will remain compliant with all local, regional, state, and federal recommendations. Our original Fortune Lake musical is being rescheduled for 2022, and we can't wait to share it with you all!

Northern Great Lakes Water Stewards 2016-2020

In 2004, ten area bishops and religious leaders from the Upper Peninsula signed an Earthkeeper Covenant and embarked upon a series of environmental projects that drew attention from across North America. From 2016-2020, an interfaith environmental initiative, the Northern Great Lakes Interfaith Water Stewards carried on this effort by seeking to preserve, protect, and sanctify the lakes and streams of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Messiah served as a key anchor for this outreach. It provided a role as a "mother ship" with both critical financial and moral support. Messiah's sanctuary served as the central community gathering site during this period of time for seven presentations that included American Indian tribal leaders, community activists, poets, theologians, botanists, and physicians.

Benchmarks for the Water Stewards efforts included 46 columns on the "Gift of Water" published in the Marquette Monthly over these past years written by 46 different authors. Eight public service announcements were produced and distributed for regional radio stations. Three thousand (3,000) Northern white cedar trees were planted by in the Yellow Dog Community Forest. Volunteers included Messiah confirmation students, youth, NMU students, and folks from all ages and backgrounds.

We are now preparing to launch Interfaith Water Stewards II

This is envisioned to be another four-year initiative 2021-2025. It will specifically focus on monitoring, protecting, and ensuring the highest quality for our drinking water across Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Both the Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Northern Michigan and Katherine Finegan, Bishop of the Northern Great Lakes Synod (ELCA) have pledged their support along with the leadership of the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community and other representatives of faith- based communities. Fred and Kathy Maynard, members of Messiah, will be serving as key resources.

The Water Stewards Initiative II is coordinated by the Cedar Tree Institute, a nonprofit organization that provides services and initiates projects in the areas of mental health, religion, and the environment. Jon Magnuson, formerly campus pastor at NMU, and Paul Lehmberg, priest of our local Zen Buddhist community, continue their leadership roles. We will be approaching, as in previous years, Messiah's Social Team and Messiah's pastoral leadership to help us carry on this work.

AMMPARO Team

AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, and Opportunities) began meeting midyear in 2019. This task force grew out of the excitement and energy of the confirmation students' commitment to learn about immigration and refugee issues in the United States.

Our team worked on several projects at the beginning of 2020:

We planned and hosted a talk by Mary Flynn on Wednesday February 5 at 6:30 pm following the community meal. Mary Flynn is the program director of Refugee and Immigrant Services (Lutheran Social Services-Milwaukee) and she spoke about her work welcoming and resettling immigrants and refugees to the US. Her talk was well-attended and included several people from the Marquette community as well as from Messiah.

We had planned to have Mary Campbell from AMMPARO present a program at Messiah on Wednesday April 1 after the Community Meal and Lent evening worship. Because of the pandemic and shutdown, we ended up scheduling a meeting with her via Zoom on October 21 at 6:30 pm. Unfortunately attendance at this meeting was low. However, participants learned some exciting information about welcoming asylum seekers. When Mary Flynn from LIRS spoke to us back in February we were under the impression that we could not sponsor a refugee person or family because we were not within the appointed mileage of Milwaukee. While that is of course true, Mary Campbell told us that we could sponsor someone who is an asylum seeker. She said this would be a future event because the government isn't currently approving asylees. However, if that changes, she said that we could be eligible to sponsor an individual or family. This would include us being prepared to sponsor them for 1-2 years, provide housing, representation, job search assistance, and medical care. We would also need a committed group of people who would help to provide these things.

During the first week in March of 2020, twelve of Messiah's members, Pastor Andrew, and Pastor Molly traveled to the border between the United States and Mexico. They spent a week between Las Cruces, NM, and El Paso, TX, learning from the coordinator of Border Servant Corps along with speakers, immigrants and refugees, non-profit leaders, and border agents. They also saw immigration court proceedings and traveled across the border to Ciudad Juarez in Mexico. Through this immersive learning experience the group gained knowledge about the difficult complexities of immigration, treatment of refugees, asylum seekers, and immigrants, and the history of the border, border wall, and policing at the border. Please stay tuned throughout the next months as participants begin to share their stories.

Financial Assistance Team

In this unusual year, two things are notable in our Assistance Ministry:

(1) The number of individual visits and requests decreased from 2019 and (2) the funds contributed increased! Several factors were in play - our church was closed for most of the year and all visits since March have been done by phone, AND our Giving Tuesday event netted \$20,380. In addition, we received a grant from the United Way/Community Foundation fund of \$2,000 and another grant from the Northern Great Lakes Synod of \$500. So here is what we accomplished:

Contributions in 2020 - \$37,142 (\$29,176 in 2019)

Number of Individual visits in 2020- 215 (332 in 2019)

Funds Distributed in 2020 - \$20,262 (\$34,317 in 2019)

Average amount per visit in 2020 - \$94.25 (\$103 in 2019)

Help Most Requested:

Housing - \$8806.

Gas Cards - \$1152.

Utilities - \$4976.

Medical - \$454.

Grocery Cards - \$250.

Insurance - \$662.

Auto Expenses - \$732.

Miscellaneous - \$2180.

Other Gifts - Crop Walk - \$1,000; Little Brothers - \$50.

We ended 2020 with nearly \$17,000 in the Community Assistance fund which will be very helpful as we face 2021 when the emergency measures now in place are lifted and our community faces the challenges ahead.

Thanks to the volunteers, Dick and Karen Oslund, Bill Davis and Mary Lou Blomquist who have been doing phone visits, Jen and Inga who make assistance appointments Mike Hill who keeps the financial records and all who contributed to this ministry in 2020.

Women of the ELCA (WELCA)

Messiah WELCA circles met at the beginning of the year for Bible study and fellowship but suspended in-person meetings in March due to the pandemic. Two circles, Women Reaching Women and Rachel Circle, continued to meet throughout the year via Zoom.

Rebecca Circle was able to meet for in-person Bible study at church in September and October when building restrictions opened up a little in the summer and fall.

Circle Offerings for 2020 total \$244.00, and \$177.00 was sent to NGLS Women of the ELCA.

Messiah Quilts and Kits for Lutheran World Relief

Our usual fall ingathering of quilt, baby care kits and personal care kits for Lutheran World Relief looked a lot different this year. In previous years, churches from the central and western UP brought their quilts and kits to a site in Ishpeming where they were loaded on a boxcar or a semitruck and transported to a warehouse in St. Paul. Because of the pandemic, we came to the difficult decision to cancel this event and wait until next year when we could do it safely. Thankfully Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp offered its facility as a drop-off site November 16-25 for all LWR items. On Monday November 23, Phil and Nancy Hoover, Jeff Dodge and Jamie Dodge loaded a UHaul with Messiah's quilts and kits and drove to Fortune Lake. Finance Committee

Committee members: Doug Morton (Treasurer), Mike Hill (Parish Accountant), Nina Nelson, Mark Paupore (term ended in 2020), Stephen Luty (term started in 2020) Kerry McGinley, Eric Walters, Pastor Andrew Plocher. We wish to thank Mark Paupore for his many years of service to our committee.

In 2020, your Finance Committee continued to meet on a monthly basis, mostly electronically using Zoom. The financial reports were distributed electronically, so everything we would normally review in person was reviewed each month. In case you were wondering, this includes financial statements for all of our funds, bank statements, credit card statements, and anything else that comes up.

The Finance Committee dealt with a great deal of uncertainty this year. Back in the first quarter of the year, who could have predicted we wouldn't be worshiping together in our building for the rest of the year? And even if we could have predicted that, who knew what our income would look like?

Thanks to the strong leadership of the Council and our Pastors, we have been almost "business as usual." at least financially. Very early in the pandemic, we applied for and obtained a Paycheck Protection Program loan. Having spent the proceeds on qualified expenses, we applied to have the loan forgiven, and that was approved. So we do not have to pay it back.

Because of our shifting from in-person worship to on-line worship, a lot of changes had to be made. Cameras, microphones, cables, computers and more had to be purchased. Our sound system had to be upgraded, even though it was fairly new. It was fine for the radio broadcast and our PA system, but not adequate for streaming purposes. All this costs money. An appeal was made, and about \$11,000 was raised to help cover these expenses.

Thanks to your continued support and generosity, we came through 2020 in very good financial shape. Contributions came in about as pledged and otherwise expected. Even though we continued to pay our staff whether or not they were working, other expenses were down (utilities are a good example). This all helped to cover the extra expenses due to the pandemic (the addition of plexiglass shields in the office, increased cleaning and sanitizing, signage, etc.).

We reviewed and updated our insurance coverages, and especially thank Bill Weaver for all his work on this.

A major task completed recently was the updating of our investment account (mostly our Memorial Funds). We now have full access to our accounts. There had been numerous personnel changes since our account was last updated, so we did not have full access. This will now be monitored on an ongoing basis to prevent any future issues. It is important to note that at no time was there any risk to our investments.

We continue to work with the Audit committee. Due to the pandemic, we have not yet completed the 2019 audit work – it had been planned for about the time we had to close our offices to the public. But we now have plans in place to get it done. The 2020 audit will be completed soon thereafter.

In case you would be interested, our meetings are open to visitors. We generally meet on the third Tuesday of each month at 5:15 pm. It will take a little pre-planning since we are now meeting electronically, but if you let us know ahead of time, we can get you access.

2021 Budget Summary

As you read this proposed budget, please keep in mind that every number corresponds with our ministry. Each number tells the story of how we share the love of God with our neighbors – through our building, our staff, our worship, our programs, and our parish extension.

The proposed 2021 budget is mostly a continuation from Messiah's 2020 budget with a few small changes. It was unanimously approved of at the January 21, 2021 Council meeting.

First, at the request of the Personnel Committee, the Council unanimously approved a 2.5% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) for our staff. That increase can be seen across personnel line items, most notably salaries, but also in FICA and retirement contributions.

Second, we have a few additional staff costs for 2021. Dan Zini has joined our staff as our audio/ visual technician. We plan to continue to stream worship (8:45 and 10:30, and special services) once we return to in-person worship. This cost is reflected in line item 50915. We also have added premium reimbursement for our office administrator. As a full-time employee we could have much higher costs for providing for her insurance, but this addition (line 50525) provides for her insurance and saves us money. This is similar to how we provide insurance for Pr. Andrew.

All other increases are based on anticipated increases to ministry costs. We have also increased our parish extension with our synod contribution. In 2021 it will be \$84,000.

Please remember that any budget is a living document and will likely continue to change. We never could have imagined the changes that came in 2020 and, with the congregation's generosity, managed to navigate them quite well. The Council and Finance Committee will continue to work hand in hand with our finances. While the proposed 2021 budget has a projected deficit of \$18,172, we do not believe that will be the case. Our costs during the pandemic continue to come in under budget and we anticipate that will continue to be the case until we return to in-person ministry in our building. Also, we exited 2020 in very healthy financial shape, and are able to weather these costs if necessary.
