News from The Free Store

The New Free Store is an inter-faith, non-profit group supporting people in the greater Marquette area who express a need for free clothing, linen, hygiene & cleaning supplies. Over 850 families are now registered to shop for free & that number continues to grow. When doing your weekly shopping, please remember the items noted below in the coming months. Thank you for your support! Feel free to leave these items in The New Free Store 'drop-box' in Messiah's narthex.

*March - shampoo (male/female) & conditioner (female) *April – laundry detergent, dish soap, bar soap

Here are some other ways you can support The Free Store:

1. If you are a Thrivent member with investments &/or insurance, you may have Thrivent Choice dollars that you could give to one of ten different organizations in Marquette County including: The New Free Store, YMCA, United Way, Queen's Heart, Habitat for Humanity, Marquette Community Foundation, Western Marquette County Health Foundation, Ishpeming Cancer Society, Lakestate Industries, SAIL and the Vista Theater. You can designate or allocate your Thrivent Choice dollars to any one of these non-profits that are registered with Thrivent, in our area. These funds would need to be allocated by or before March 31, 2021. Thank you!

2. The New Free Store is looking for a volunteer with some type of accounting or bookkeeping background to help them with a financial compilation. This is a type of an audit on their organization and it is a way to continue to be transparent to all those connected with them. The work involved in this financial compilation would not take more than one day and most likely would only take a half day. They would like to have this work done sometime between now and October of this year. 3. The New Free Store building, which is located in Harvey, is on the market. They share the space with Lakestate Industries. The building is being sold through Northern Michigan Landbrokers. Depending on what the buyer decides, The New Free Store could continue on in

the same building and pay rent; or if they need to vacate the space, they are looking for anyone that might have a suggestion of space for them to use. If you know of any open space in Marquette that would be well suited for them, they would appreciate you sharing that with them. Thank you!

4. Lastly, The New Free Store would like to extend a heartfelt THANK YOU to members & friends of Messiah who continue to help their operations, in many ways. They are thankful for Messiah members who volunteer with their organization; and they are grateful for all the items that are donated to them from Messiah members & friends who leave items in Messiah's narthex.

Faith in Action—a Summary of News for LWR Quilters and Kit Makers

As most of the Ingatherings of quilts and kits were canceled this fall, many churches went the extra mile(s) to deliver items to Minnesota and Maryland warehouses. The shelves were completely bare but the need continued and grew during the year. Seven camps, including Fortune Lake, acted as collection points. Other congregations rented tucks for long haul trips. There were 616,210 neighbors in need in 23 countries who received 264,585 quilts, 12,960 blankets, 174,055 school kits, 71,900 personal care kits, 12,300 fabric kits, 52,860 baby care kits and 40,750 face masks.

A photo of the pictures Rashkov and her 9 children drew saying "We are thanking God for your great work" is from Ukraine where 16,000 people received quilts. Personal Care Kits reached people devastated by Hurricanes Eta and lota in Honduras. Face masks in every color and pattern went to Mali and Haiti. Another container of masks is on its way to Latin America and more will be shipped this year. As with the quilts and kits, masks are only sent when companions ask for them.

LWR is so grateful for how flexible and resourceful all of us have been.

Make plans and keep working. My mother said that each stitch was a prayer so pray, pray, pray.

Global Mission Notes from the ELCA

Since I was in Sunday School I've been interested in just what the church is doing to spread and support Christ's message and the life of churches throughout the world. Since a themed bulletin board in Messiah's atrium would not be seen by many this year, I decided to summarize the report for 2021.

In each area the ELCA model is to accompany/walk alongside companions in more than 90 countries and do God's work of restoring and reconciling communities. This includes strengthening their Lutheran identity, training leaders, and exploring different ministry models. In Latin America and the Caribbean the emphasis is to defend human rights and promote economic, gender and climate justice. They/we seek just and human treatment of migrants, refugees and asylum-seekers through the work of our AMMPARO companions in the region. The regional emphasis in the Middle East and North Africa is to actually accompany companions in their steadfast Christian witness, service and faith, which are threatened by regional turmoil. We also advocate with them for nonviolent paths to more peaceful and just societies and respond to humanitarian needs.

Asia/Pacific congregations meet challenges of religious plurality, address gender justice and tackle concerns over migration and human trafficking.

In Africa we strengthen mutual relationships and support programs of companion churches addressing conflict prevention, peace and reconciliation, evangelical outreach, faith formation, food security, sustainable livelihoods and health. In Ghana the Good News Theological Seminary leaders and Muslim community leaders aired radio programs to teach about virus transmission. Then they provided masks and modified buckets to motorcycle taxi drivers and market women. In Malawi farm field schools teach farmers to test and adopt sustainable agriculture methods to make the community food-self-sufficient.28 mission personnel serve in East, West and Southern Africa in 2020. 49 synod companionships connect 48 ELCA synods and one ELC-Canada to Lutheran bodies in 23 countries. (I don't have a number of companion congregations- just synodical connections.) Messiah helped support 3 missionaries in Tanzania in 2020.

The regional emphasis in Europe is to build capacity of minority Lutheran churches for evangelism, mission and development of lay and pastoral leadership. With these churches we work to develop organization that support and empower the most vulnerable populations in the region. 85% of ELCA World Hunger grants in Europe supporting work with Roam communities,

refugees, asylum-seekers and children and families living in poverty. ELCA members also work with over a dozen Lutheran church bodies in former Eastern bloc countries.

Evangelical church in Germany (EKD) and ELCA contributed toward the purchase of the vessel Sea-Watch 4 operated by United4rescue on behalf of 600 civic and church organization to rescue refugees on the Mediterranean. In August 2020, after delivering 353 refugees to Palermo, Italy, the ship was detained by Italian authorities but Heinrich Bedford-Strohm, EKD president and bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria, continues to advocate for a humane response to the situation in the Mediterranean.

So what is the emphasis for global mission in North America? Well it is to equip ELCA members to engage with their local and global communities through mutual relationship and accompaniment. We collaborate with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada concerning missionaries, global events and companion synod relationships.

Lutheran World Relief-Baby Care Kit Collection

Last year through your help and generosity we were able to put together 46 baby care kits. LWR had asked that whatever anyone had and if able, could they send them. In November, they were taken to Fortune Lake and from there shipped to LWR. The need is always there. We will start our 2021 collection in February.

We have depleted our inventory completely and will be collecting these items:

+ lightweight cotton T-shirts (no onesies) sizes 12-24 months

- + long or short sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet) sizes 12-24 months
- + hand towels, dark colored
- + bath-size bars of Ivory soap equaling 8-9 oz, in original wrapping
- + receiving blankets (could be crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn up to 52 inches square)
- + jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with hood or include a baby cap
- + cloth diapers, flat-fold preferred
- + pair of socks
- + diaper pins or large safety pins

ELCA leaders Call on Congress to Pass U.S. Citizenship Act

CHICAGO (March 5, 2021) — The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has joined more than 500 ELCA rostered ministers and the CEOs of Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) and Lutheran Services in America (LSA) in calling on Congress to support the U.S. Citizenship Act of 2021. In a March 4 letter, the leaders urge lawmakers to work collaboratively to advance legislation "around a long overdue solution that reflects our shared values as a nation."

The ELCA, LIRS and LSA recognize the need for legislative action based upon their historic service to and accompaniment of communities with migrant and refugee populations. Lutherans respond to people who are caught in conflict and face persecution, and they advocate for compassionate, just and wise immigration policies, driven by God's love for all people and a biblical commitment to welcome the stranger.

"Guided by our faith values and biblical teachings, we believe that immigration policies must prioritize and honor the God-given dignity of each person, especially those who live on the margins of society," the letter states. "We regard the family as an indispensable social institution and stand firmly against policies that cause the separation of families. We are therefore pleased to see that the proposed legislation works to recognize these values." ELCA social teaching and actions insist on family reunification, upholding human dignity and rights, driving cooperative responses to the root causes of forced migration, and stressing inclusion and equity across federal immigration policy. Several provisions of the legislation advance these commitments.

Across an expanding network, welcoming congregations of the ELCA, for example, closely accompany migrants in the United States through ministry and advocacy. Lutherans across the country also participate in resettling refugees who have been admitted with the support of LIRS.

Reacting to a Supreme Court decision on the popular Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program last summer, the ELCA continued to press for permanent protection for Dreamers and just treatment for other undocumented communities. The U.S. Citizenship Act makes a promising contribution toward ensuring a just immigration system.

"Making progress on these long overdue immigration reforms is important to us as leaders who serve in church and society," the letter states. "We ask God to guide our nation and grant the grace of a welcoming heart. To that end, we ask you to work collaboratively, with haste, to promote this comprehensive legislative solution through Congress and provide lasting solutions that will strengthen our nation for generations to come."
