What is Centering Prayer?

Centering prayer is a form of silent prayer that emphasizes resting in God's presence through silence and a sacred word. It involves finding a quiet space, sitting comfortably, and focusing on a chosen word to help maintain stillness and let go of thoughts. The goal is to cultivate a deeper relationship with God through stillness and receptivity. Several members of Messiah lead groups that practice this form of prayer throughout the week as a piece of their faith life. -

Centering Prayer

But when you pray, go to your room, shut the door, and pray to God who is in that secret place, and your Abba God-who sees all that is done in secret, will reward you...Your God knows what you need before you ask it. Matthew 6:6, 7 The Inclusive Bible
The Spirit of God has made a home in you. Romans 8:9
Be silent and know that I am God! Psalm 46:10

“There are all kinds of ways in which God speaks to us-through our thoughts or any one of our faculties. But keep in mind that God’s first language is silence. Prepare yourself for silence in this prayer, and if other things happen, that is His problem, not yours. As soon as you make it your problem, you tend to desire something that is other than God. Pure faith will bring you closer to God than anything else. To be attached to an experience of God is not God, it is a thought. The time of centering prayer is the time to let go of all thoughts, even the best of thoughts. If they are really good, they will come back later.

Don’t judge centering prayer on the basis of how many thoughts come or how much peace you enjoy. The only way to judge this prayer is by its long-range fruits: whether in daily life you enjoy greater peace, humility and charity. Having come to deep interior silence, you begin to relate to others beyond the superficial aspects of social status, race, nationality, religion and personal characteristics.” Thomas Keating

All are welcome and you do not need to have been practicing centering prayer as the instructions are simple and we go over them for newcomers. You also do not need to commit to attendance every week. Come when you can. Tuesdays from 11-noon.

And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God? (Micah 6:8 NRSVUE)

WHAT WE BELIEVE

Hunger is an affront to justice. Today, although food is abundant in our country and our world, hunger is surging in communities near and far – driven by conflict, climate-fueled disasters, failing economies and unjust policies that have undermined the safety nets so many of our neighbors rely on to survive.

But it doesn't have to be this way.

As people of faith, our vision is a world where everyone has access to enough nutritious food to thrive. We believe that, by standing shoulder to shoulder, our vision can become reality, around the corner and around the world.

Hunger is deeply tied to other injustices. Across the globe, it robs millions of people of health and opportunity – especially those who lack access to clean water and safe sanitation. Hunger disproportionately affects refugees and immigrants, families recovering from disasters, people experiencing homelessness and others whose voices are too often ignored or silenced. But by bringing together our skills, experience and passion to this vital shared mission, we can heed God's call *"to loose the bonds of injustice...to let the oppressed go free, to break every yoke and to share your bread with the hungry."* (Isaiah 58:7).

Through this Ecumenical Statement on Hunger Justice, we are answering the scriptural call to "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:31) to ensure all have what they need to thrive. We

pledge to be the neighbor that everyone in our world deserves so that no one goes hungry in a nation and world of such plenty. In faith and solidarity, **Your signature.**

Grandparent-Aged Allies for LGBTQ+ Community: Book and Conversation Club for 2025-2026

What is the Idea? A small group of grandparent-aged individuals gather eight times between October 2025 and May 2026 to explore the terrain of being an ally to the LGBTQ+ community in the Upper Peninsula.

What is Expected? To read two books which contain LGBTQ+ themes and using the books as a catalyst for conversation, to talk openly about the LGBTQ+ experience.

How often, where, and when will the meetings be? Gathering will be on the third Tuesday of the month at St. John's Episcopal Church in Negaunee from 11:30 am to 1:00 pm. January's gathering and May's gathering will be at a different time and place and will involve a larger group of folks reading the same book. Details concerning these meetings are yet to be determined.

What is an Ally? An ally is someone who walks beside and stands up for another person. Allies continue to be curious and naturally seek out ways to be and stay informed. Allies are motivated by compassion. ALLYSHIP is something that can be learned.

What else do I need to know?

1. It only takes one caring and accepting adult to decrease an LGBTQ+ youth's risk for suicide by 70%. It is possible to learn how to be that caring adult.
2. This Grandparent-Aged Ally group is part of the new iteration of last year's LGBTQ+ book conversation group. It is being spearheaded by Equality Michigan. Our partnership this year includes ELCA Lutheran Churches in Ishpeming St. John's Episcopal Church in Negaunee, and Equality Michigan.
3. There will be delicious soup for lunch at each of these meetings.

4. Our first meeting on October 21st will be a meet and greet: no reading will be necessary in advance of that meeting.
