

The original title of our Advent devotional was "What do you fear?: Insisting on hope this Advent." Our small committee that planned the activities and agreed upon the resources for this Advent season was in consensus we didn't like the title. Sometimes things hit a little too close to home. I'm writing to you on the day after the government shutdown ended and if you asked me yesterday, what do I fear? I'd have said, people out of work, babies without Head Start, hungry people losing their SNAP benefits, on and on. But, if you ask me today, I'd say, I'm afraid that this isn't the end. It's already been revealed that the government has the power to strip away the benefits of those who need and rely on them the most. They have the power to make us scared and uncertain and angry and afraid. And so, that title did hit too close to home and I didn't want to have to dwell in the despair of it all. I didn't want to have to bear witness to the parallels between our lived realities and the uncertainty of the political world that Jesus was born into. I'd much rather focus on the light, the joy and the Christmas decorations (which yes, I have already put up as of Nov. 10th). Even if I'm reluctant, it might be important to ask: if we admit what we fear, how does that open up space for Jesus to be born into the anguish of it. I recently was thinking about Martin Luther's theology of the cross. It's a theology that proclaims, God experienced the worst that the world holds, a painful and humiliating death, and therefore, God understands the suffering that we bear. I wonder if this theology of the cross holds true for our political climate as well. Jesus was born into an uncertain time. To put it very briefly, the Jewish people were living under empire, Herod was a puppet king whose goal was to keep the peace and there were uprisings of the Jewish people that were quickly and violently squashed by the Romans. Turbulent times indeed. But the very times that needed Jesus' message. Likewise, we are living in a time that also clearly needs Jesus' message. We need to know that suffering, fear and violence don't have the last word. We need to know that even when it seems futile, there is still a reason to insist on hope. Not the hope that's a pipedream,

but the type of hope that keeps us awake at night thinking about inviting a neighbor to Christmas dinner or that contemplates the letter written to a senator or takes stock of our coats that can be donated. Hope that pushes us forward. Because we bear the hope of Christ, the knowledge that things can be different, we carry that hope with us. Maybe that's a huge piece of who we're called to be as Christians and what we need to be reminded of this Advent season. We must remember that we are people who insist on hope but who aren't afraid to name the fear because we trust that Jesus can come into it all. So let us welcome Jesus into it all this Advent season, into the joy and hope and into the pain and darkness, trusting in the promise that He shall be born to us on Christmas day.

This Advent: Preparing Your Heart for Hope

This year we will explore how we work our way through fear and prepare our hearts for the hope of the gospels in this season leading up to Jesus' birth. Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with this opening line: "In the time of Herod..." This detail may seem minor to modern readers; however, it reveals layers of information about the fearful world Jesus entered, one filled with rampant oppression, economic disparity, uncertainty, and instability. A world not so unlike our own. And yet, throughout the stories of Christ's birth, the whispers of angels deliver a surprising message: "Do not fear." In our own time, we might ask: is it even possible to be fearless in a fearful world? When Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the magi are each called into God's redemptive story, they do not deny their fears—they move through them. They ask questions, hold fast to courage, trust in good news, and say, "Here I am, Lord." When we find ourselves in fearful times, can we acknowledge our fears while also insisting on hope? We've crafted an Advent series that takes seriously the angels' message and trusts that Christ's birth truly is good news of great joy for all people. – Taken from "A Sanctified Art"

Endowment Committee News

The Endowment committee has been meeting this past year to develop guidelines to administer the Robert Malette Endowment fund for sustaining growth and to create a method to distribute funds as grants to support the mission of Messiah. These documents including applications forms for grants have been reviewed by Messiah's Finance Committee and Messiah's legal support and they are being submitted to Council for approval. The regulations governing the endowment fund needs to be presented to the entire congregation at two meetings before these documents can be voted on and adopted.

In anticipation of approval, applications for grant funding along with directions should be available by January 1, 2026. The completed applications will need to be returned by February 1, 2026 so that they can be reviewed and submitted to Council for action.

What is Centering Prayer?

Centering prayer is a form of silent prayer that emphasizes resting in God's presence through silence and a sacred word. It involves finding a quiet space, sitting comfortably, and focusing on a chosen word to help maintain stillness and let go of thoughts. The goal is to cultivate a deeper relationship with God through stillness and receptivity. Several members of Messiah lead groups that practice this form of prayer throughout the week as a piece of their faith life. -- Pr. Molly Hunter

Becoming A Mystic

"A mystic is someone who skips over the intermediaries and goes straight to God; someone who experiences the divine as an intimate encounter, rather than an article of faith. A mystical experience may or may not be connected to established spiritual traditions. Mysticism is not about concepts—it's about communion with ultimate reality.

When we make a pact with ourselves to show up for reality, just as it is, reality rewards us by revealing its hidden holiness." from "Ordinary Mysticism" by Mirabai Starr.

In Centering Prayer, we learn to let go of our concepts of what life is about, who God is, who we are, and be still. Silence is God's language and we attempt to receive what it is that God wishes for us to know.

You can practice centering prayer on your own, but it is greatly enhanced by practicing with others. "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." Matthew 18:20

A Smart Way to Give... IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution

Did you know that you can give through your IRA?

This is a wonderful giving opportunity for those over 70½: Federal legislation allows you to make tax-free distributions from your IRA directly to a charity, such as our church. This distribution means no increased income or payment of additional tax. This opportunity may be used for your annual stewardship gift or a planned gift to our church.

Some of the details of the IRA Rollover:

- Donors must be age 70½ or older at the time of transfer.
- Distributions must be made (1) directly from the trustee (2) to the qualified charity, such as our church.
- This qualifies toward the IRA owner's Required Minimum Distribution.
- Distributions are not included in the owner's adjusted gross income.
- No taxes are paid on qualified charitable distributions.
- Please consult your qualified professional advisers on how this gift would fit into your overall plans and your eligibility for tax benefits.

Take a short walk, even in the cold. Let each step be a prayer: "God, walk with me. Walk with us."

December 8 – Feed Another

Make a meal or snack for someone else. Drop it off, invite them in, or pack a lunch for someone who needs it.

December 9 – Choose Beauty

Do one thing that makes your space or day more beautiful—light a candle, hang a string of lights, or display something meaningful.

December 10 – Remember the Lonely

Write a card or letter to someone who might feel alone this season. Mail it today.

December 11 – Mid-Advent Check-In

What has surprised you this month? What still feels tender? Give thanks for both.

December 12 – Practice Hope

Hope is a practice, not a feeling. Do something today that leans toward healing or change—even if you don't feel ready.

December 13 – Give a Gift, Just Because

Wrap something simple and leave it for someone—homemade bread, an ornament, a poem, a pack of cocoa.

December 14 – Pray for the Children

Lift up children in your life and community. Pray: "God of gentleness, protect their joy and grow their dreams."

December 15 – Take One Brave Step

Do one small thing today that scares you a little but leads toward life: a hard conversation, a new habit, or an honest word.

December 16 – Let Go of Perfect

Cross one thing off your to-do list without doing it. Let peace matter more than productivity today.

December 17 - Shelter and Solidarity

Donate a warm item—socks, gloves, coat—or volunteer at a shelter.

Pray for those seeking safety this winter.

December 18 – Give Thanks for Ordinary Goodness

Thank someone who shows up consistently: the custodian, the grocery clerk, the neighbor who always waves.

December 19 - Watch for Wonder

Look for something today that catches you off guard—a child laughing, snow falling, the sky shifting. Wonder is everywhere.

December 20 - Be Someone's Warmth

Bring warmth to someone else today—through your presence, your words, your help.

December 21 – Longest Night, Deepest Light
