Giving Tuesday Updates

Messiah has once again shown our extreme generosity and taking the message of the Gospel seriously this year. On December 2 – our 7th Giving Tuesday event, 58 took time to people took the time to come in person and 24 others called or mailed donations. We are now at \$29,150 and some funds are still coming in! This is a record!

Here are some statistics as of December 10. The final totals will be available in the annual report.

- 1. First Giving Tuesday Event 2017. We raised \$27,057.37, with \$10,000 coming from a Thrivent Grant.
- 2. Since that time, we have AVERAGED \$34,600 per year in funds distributed.
- 3. We have taken an AVERAGE of 350 interview appointments per year since 2017, including interviews being taken over the phone during COVID.
- 4. This year 2025 we have had 387 interview appointments and distributed \$54,543.22 with 20 more days in the year left!

This ministry has become an important part of the safety net in our area. A huge THANK YOU to all who contributed, donated prizes, volunteered and prayed for this effort. --- Mary Lou Blomquist

A Daily Guide for December 2025

December 1 - Begin in Hope

Light a candle and say aloud: "Even now, I believe light is coming."

Write one hope you carry into this month. Post it where you'll see it daily.

December 2 - Make Space

Declutter a drawer, shelf, or calendar slot. Let go of what's no longer needed.

Pray: "Make room in me for peace, joy, and presence."

December 3 - Fear Isn't the End

Write down one fear that's been speaking loudly.

Now, below it, write what hope says back.

December 4 - Reach Out

Text or call someone who feels far away. Let them know you're thinking of them.

December 5 - Find the Warmth

Wrap yourself in a blanket. Sip something hot.

Name three things that make you feel safe and held.

December 6 - Light in the Window

Place a candle or light in your window tonight. Let it be a sign—for your neighbors, for yourself—that love is near.

December 7 - Pray While You Walk

Take a short walk, even in the cold. Let each step be a prayer: "God, walk with me. Walk with us."

December 8 – Feed Another

Make a meal or snack for someone else. Drop it off, invite them in, or pack a lunch for someone who needs it.

December 9 – Choose Beauty

Do one thing that makes your space or day more beautiful—light a candle, hang a string of lights, or display something meaningful.

December 10 - Remember the Lonely

Write a card or letter to someone who might feel alone this season. Mail it today.

December 11 - Mid-Advent Check-In

What has surprised you this month? What still feels tender?

Give thanks for both.

December 12 - Practice Hope

Hope is a practice, not a feeling. Do something today that leans toward healing or change—even if you don't feel ready.

December 13 – Give a Gift, Just Because

Wrap something simple and leave it for someone—homemade bread, an ornament, a poem, a pack of cocoa.

December 14 - Pray for the Children

Lift up children in your life and community. Pray: "God of gentleness, protect their joy and grow their dreams."

December 15 - Take One Brave Step

Do one small thing today that scares you a little but leads toward life: a hard conversation, a new habit, or an honest word.

December 16 - Let Go of Perfect

Cross one thing off your to-do list without doing it. Let peace matter more than productivity today.

December 17 – Shelter and Solidarity

Donate a warm item—socks, gloves, coat—or volunteer at a shelter.

Pray for those seeking safety this winter.

December 18 – Give Thanks for Ordinary Goodness

Thank someone who shows up consistently: the custodian, the grocery clerk, the neighbor who always waves.

December 19 – Watch for Wonder

Look for something today that catches you off guard—a child laughing, snow falling, the sky shifting. Wonder is everywhere.

December 20 - Be Someone's Warmth

Bring warmth to someone else today—through your presence, your words, your help.

Say: "Even now, love shows up."

December 21 – Longest Night, Deepest Light

On the solstice, light a candle in the dark and say:

"The light is coming. I will not give up hope."

December 22 - Listen Generously

Have a conversation today where you mostly just listen. Make space for someone's story without needing to fix or respond.

December 23 – Deliver Joy

Drop off cookies or treats for someone nearby—a neighbor, teacher, bus driver, or postal worker. Include a simple thank-you note.

December 24 - Christmas Eve: Love Breaks In

Read Luke 2:1–20. Light a candle. Sit in stillness. Say:

"Even now, Christ is born. Even now, good news lives."

December 25 - Christmas Day: Joy is Here

Bundle up and step outside, even for five minutes.

Look around and whisper: "God is with us. Joy to the world."

December 26 - Rest Well

Give yourself permission to rest today. Breathe deeply. Be gentle with your body. Light a candle and do nothing.

December 27 – Remember Who Carried You

Write down the names of three people or communities that supported you this year. Give thanks—and maybe reach out.

December 28 - Pay It Forward

Buy coffee for a stranger, support a mutual aid fund, or offer a ride. Let your generosity ripple.

December 29 – Look Toward the New

Begin asking: What do I want to carry into the year ahead?

Make a list of three values you want to live by in 2026.

December 30 - Make a Way

Read Matthew 2:12 – "They went home by another way."

What new way might God be opening in your life?

December 31 – End With Hope

Light a candle one last time this year. Say:

"Even now, even still, God is with us. And I will keep hoping."

What is Centering Prayer?

Centering prayer is a form of silent prayer that emphasizes resting in God's presence through silence and a sacred word. It involves finding a quiet space, sitting comfortably, and focusing on a chosen word to help maintain stillness and let go of thoughts. The goal is to cultivate a deeper relationship with God through stillness and receptivity. Several members of Messiah lead groups that practice this form of prayer throughout the week as a piece of their faith life. - *Pr. Molly Hunter*

What I Know & Centering Prayer

Consciousness can be defined as our ability to know, the experience of knowing. The subject knowing the object. When we look at objects and name them, we think we know them. We think we know this person or that person because we have a name or a memory of them. We think we know all kinds of things because we remember them. Our ability to know is of the conditioned sort–knowing about, rather than knowing directly.

Buddhist practice is to abide in pure mindfulness in which there is what we call insight knowing, or direct knowledge. It is a knowledge that isn't based on perception, an idea, a position, or a doctrine, and this knowledge can only be possible through mindfulness. What we mean by mindfulness is the ability to not attach to any object, either in the material realm or the mental realm. When there is no attachment, the mind is in its pure state of awareness, intelligence, and clarity. That is mindfulness. The mind is pure and receptive, sensitive to the existing conditions. It is no longer a conditioned mind that just reacts to pleasure and pain, praise and blame, happiness and suffering. That which observes and investigates is what we call a reflective mind. The human mind is a reflective mind.

We ask questions: Who am I? Why was I born? What is life all about? What happens when I die? Is there meaning or purpose to life? But because we tend to think that other people know and we don't, we often seek the answers from others, rather than opening the mind and watching through patient alertness for truth to be revealed. Through mindfulness and awareness, revelation is possible. This revelation of truth or ultimate reality, is what the religious experience really amounts to. When we bind ourselves to the divine, and engage our whole being in that bond, we allow this revelation of truth, which we call insight—profound and true insight—into the nature of things. Revelation is ineffable as well. Words are not quite capable of expressing it. That is why revelations can be very different. How they are stated, how they are produced through speech, can be infinitely variable.

So a Buddhist's revelations sound very Buddhist and a Christian's revelations sound very Christian. There's nothing wrong with that. But we need to recognize the limitation of the convention of language. We need to understand that language is not ultimately true or ultimately real; it is the attempt to communicate this ineffable reality to others.

Today we have an opportunity to work toward a common truth among all religions; we can all begin to help each other. It's no longer a time when converting people or trying to compete with each other seems to be of any use or value. Rather than attempt to convert others, religion presents the opportunity to awaken to our true nature, to true freedom to love and compassion. It's a way of living in full sensitivity, with full receptivity, so we can take delight in and open ourselves to the mystery and wonder of the universe for the rest of our lives. --- The Mind and the Way by AjahnSumedho
