To meet WEDNESDAYS at NOON for "DWELLING IN THE WORD." Bring your lunch, if you wish, to Messiah's Atrium and dwell in God's Word with fellow disciples and seekers. Pastor Steve is reserving the whole Noon hour but come for the time & times you're able. Together we'll reflect using the story of God's people led by the Holy Spirit in Acts.

What is "Dwelling in the Word"? It is a simple, prayerful practice many congregations use to listen more deeply to Scripture and to one another. A short passage is read aloud slowly – usually more than once – with time for quiet reflection. Participants are invited to notice a word or phrase that stands out and to share what they hear God stirring in them. Over time, this shared listening helps us grow in trust, imagination, and clarity about where the Spirit may be leading next.

From Pastor Steve: A Pastoral Reflection for the 250th Anniversary of American Independence

[A Moment to Remember Who We Are](#)

This summer our nation marks 250 years since the *Declaration of Independence* — a moment

that invites both gratitude and reflection. Anniversaries are not only about looking back; they help us ask who we are becoming and how we are called to live now.

As people of faith, we give thanks for the freedoms we enjoy in this country — including the freedom to worship, serve, and speak openly in Christ's name. These are gifts worth cherishing.

At the same time, we remember that our deepest identity is rooted not in any nation but in the kingdom of God. That identity shapes how we use the freedoms we've been given: to seek the common good, to listen across differences, to pray for leaders (even those we disagree with or struggle to trust), and to love our neighbors with humility and courage.

A 250th anniversary is a *chronos* milestone — a date on the calendar. But it can also be a *kairos* moment if we let it: a time for God to renew in us a sense of vocation as Christ's disciples living in this land.

May this celebration deepen our gratitude, strengthen our commitment to justice and compassion, and remind us that true freedom is always a gift meant to bless others.

DID YOU KNOW?

In July around 25 young people and adults from around our synod will be going to North Carolina to help with the ongoing work of Hurricane Helene cleanup. This includes one of Messiah's youth, Adelyn Davis & her friend, Isla Bucklin. Thank you for your support of Adelyn, Isa and the others venturing out in service.

On July 12, we'll be sending Adelyn & Isla off on their adventure with a Rite of Commissioning at the 10:30 am worship service.

The group will arrive at their NC base camp on a Sunday afternoon and do some team building and learning about the disaster areas in which they will be serving. Monday through Wednesday will be spent at sites in need of recovery work, in partnership with Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) Carolinas. All tools and supplies will be provided by LDR Carolinas. Each day will end back at camp with a time to debrief the day and worship together. On Thursday, the group will have an Adventure Day. The week ends with worship on Friday before departing.

Mid-Year Assistance Report

Since we are nearly halfway through 2026, here is a summary of where we are as of the middle of June:

Number of appointments: 140+

Funds Distributed: \$35,000+

This ministry is growing and becoming an important resource to the folks in our area. Thank you to all who contribute in various ways. We truly appreciate the \$10,000 grant from our Endowment Fund and a \$1,000 grant from the Marquette Harbor Rotary. The First Presbyterian Church offers \$200 per month, and the Episcopal Church has contributed as well. We will replenish the “coffers” again on Giving Tuesday.

Food Donations Needed

Messiah now has two shelving units by the inside of the “canopy door” where food donations can be placed. Most of the food is going to people who come to Messiah and need food assistance. If Messiah has excess food, it is brought to the Salvation Army in Marquette.

*whole grain cereals, rolled oats, rice and pasta

*canned fruits and vegetables

*cooking oil – canola or olive oil, pasta sauce, basic dried spices

*shelf-stable microwaveable meals

Council Highlights

Greetings to our Messiah family from your Church Council. The council meets the third Wednesday of every month, at 6:30 pm in room 202. Meetings are open to all congregation members.

TRANSITION TEAM FORMATION

Five applications have been received as of today's date (June 12). The council will review them at the June 17 meeting and formally empanel the Team. Keep an eye out for an invitation to a congregational gathering at which the Team will begin their journey by working with you to discern the vision of Messiah's future.

JUNE 7 CONGREGATIONAL CONVERSATION

On June 7, over 30 members of Messiah gathered with honesty, hope, and a shared desire to listen to one another. At the very beginning, participants named what they were seeking in this season of transition: understanding, forgiveness, respect, clarity, grace, identity, mutual trust, shared goals, empathy, energy, unity, and a faithful way of moving forward together. These hopes set a grace-filled tone for the conversations that followed.

Throughout the session, people shared one word needs and questions on sticky notes. Clear themes emerged: a longing for deeper listening and transparent communication; a desire for healing and forgiveness; questions about leadership roles and trust; curiosity about Messiah's identity and mission for the future; and a commitment to building healthy patterns of community life. Many expressed appreciation for the chance simply to talk, listen, and be heard.

In large group reflections, participants also named surprises and lingering questions. These centered on how we include those not present, how we rebuild trust, how scripture guides us in conflict and reconciliation, and how we prevent repeating past patterns. A strong thread throughout was the conviction that "there is strength in community building", and that Messiah can move forward with hope.

Taken together, these reflections paint a picture of a congregation that cares deeply about one another and about the future God is shaping among us. The Council will continue to work with these themes as we discern next steps in our shared life.

COUNCIL MEETING ACTIONS

The following actions were taken at the May meeting:

- Approved funding the full amount of camp fees for Fortune Lake beyond an initial deposit by the families, allowing for special circumstances.
- Malette Trust – Authorized our attorney to appeal the Court's decision on interest: The Court awarded Messiah \$112,000 in accrued interest; we contend that the actual amount should be \$263,000 (5% on the principle, per Michigan statute).
- Authorized the use of undesignated memorial funds to remove trees on church properties.
- Approve a paid Interim Children's Ministry Coordinator position (20 hours/month), and authorized Pr. Steve to offer the position to Emma Olechnowicz (who has accepted).

WORSHIP LEADERSHIP UPDATE

We continue to fill out the schedule for worship service leaders and now have commitments through the end of September except for Labor Day weekend. A reminder that there will be no communion at services led by a Lay Preacher. A schedule of upcoming preachers can be found elsewhere in this (and all future) editions of The Messenger and also will be announced at each service.

What is Centering Prayer?

Centering prayer is a form of silent prayer that emphasizes resting in God's presence through silence and a sacred word. It involves finding a quiet space, sitting comfortably, and focusing on a chosen word to help maintain stillness and let go of thoughts. The goal is to cultivate a deeper relationship with God through stillness and receptivity. Several members of Messiah lead groups that practice this form of prayer throughout the week as a piece of their faith life. -

Centering Prayer

Many of the various spiritual traditions that I've studied tell me that the world that I see is extremely distorted, because the thing that I think I am (that which "sees") is also distorted. It happens to each of us innocent humans as we grow and experience the material world. The admonition to be "in the world, not of it" makes so much more sense to me now that I've spent a lifetime exploring this worldly self and discovered some very faulty notions that were downloaded into my personality. I discovered that there is something good within me, and that is the thing I think God created. When I let go of my worldly fears and notions, my concepts of what will make me happy in life and my ideas of who or what God is...that quiet "good" thing began to have an influence on the ways that I view the world and its creatures. I started to see the world and its inhabitants as fellow travelers on the very same path...back to knowing our Oneness with each other and with the Divine. Centering prayer is a method to stop the false self from running the show and learning how to "be" from the Inner Self, the Self that knows that what is good for all of God's creation is also what is good for this single part of Creation. That is what leads to true happiness, to true safety, to feeling there is some purpose to the earthly life.

" You do not become good by trying to be good, but by finding the goodness that is already within you and allowing that goodness to emerge. But it can only emerge if something

fundamental changes in your state of consciousness. What is stirring now is not a new belief system. The change goes deeper than the content of your mind, deeper than thoughts. At the heart of the new consciousness lies the transcendence of thought, the ability to rise above thought, of realizing a dimension within yourself that is infinitely vaster than thought. You no longer derive your identity from the incessant stream of thinking that in the old consciousness you took to be yourself. Ego is no more than this: identification with form, which primarily means thought forms. This results in a total unawareness of our connectedness with the whole, our intrinsic oneness with every "other" as well as with the Source."

A Daily Guide for July

July 1 – Begin Again

Let today be a creative threshold. Ask: What can I co-create with God this month that brings hope or justice into the world?

July 2 – A Prayer for Justice

Pray: “God of righteousness, stir my heart for what is good and fair. Let my life reflect your justice and mercy.”

July 3 – Doodle Hope

Take five minutes to sketch, doodle, or scribble whatever comes to mind when you think of hope. Let it be messy and free.

July 4 – Reflect on Freedom

As you mark this day, reflect on the meaning of true freedom—not just for some, but for all. Pray: “God of liberation, help me use my freedom not for comfort or silence, but for compassion and courage. Teach me to seek justice in love.”

July 5 – Create Something New

Bake, build, write, plant, or paint. Let your creativity be a quiet resistance to despair.

July 6 – Pray with Your Hands

Engage in a hands-on task—gardening, kneading dough, folding laundry—as a form of prayer. Let every motion become a sacred rhythm.

July 7 – Listen Deeply

Seek out a story you don’t usually hear. Listen to a podcast, read a book, or watch a documentary from a different perspective.

July 8 – Write a Justice Haiku

Write a short poem about justice, mercy, or hope in haiku form. Even a few words can move hearts.

July 9 – Celebrate Progress

Notice a way the world has changed for the better—big or small. Give thanks for those who made that change possible.

July 10 – Plant Hope

Plant wildflower seeds or herbs, either in your yard, a pot, or a community space. Trust that small actions bloom.

July 11 – Name What Breaks Your Heart

Write down a justice issue or need that burdens you. Offer it to God, and ask what small role you might play in healing it.

July 12 – Joy Is Resistance

Do something joyful today on purpose. Dance, laugh, sing, or play. Let your joy stand as a defiant act of hope.

July 13 – Create Space

Declutter a corner of your life—your home, schedule, or inbox. Make room for what really matters.

July 14 – Honor a Changemaker

Reach out to someone who works for justice or healing and thank them. A note or kind word can be fuel for their journey.

July 15 – Scripture of Creative Justice

Read Amos 5:24 – “But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.” Reflect on how you might be part of that flow.

July 16 – Gratitude for Mentors

Pray for mentors and role models. Honor those who have shaped you with love and integrity.

July 17 – Make Art with Children

If you can, spend time creating with a child—coloring, crafting, imagining. See the world through their lens of wonder and hope.

July 18 – Pray with Movement

Take a walk, stretch, or do yoga as a way of praying. Let your body carry your hopes and petitions.

July 19 – Pray for Repair

Hope and justice begin with truth. Take time today to learn about a harm—historic or ongoing—in your community or country. Ask God to show you what repair might look like, and how you might be part of it.

July 20 – Midyear Check-In

We're halfway through the year. Ask: What's growing in me? What needs to be pruned or planted?

July 21 – Bless the Light

Step into the sunlight and bless the warmth. Say, "God, thank you for the light within and around me."

July 22 – Create a Visual Prayer

Use images, magazine clippings, or found objects to make a collage prayer. Let your creativity express your longings.

July 23 – Pay Attention to Injustice

Notice one injustice in your community today. What do you see that others might ignore? Ask God how you might respond.

July 24 – Bless the Artists

Pray for artists, poets, and creators who help us see truth and beauty. May their work challenge, comfort, and inspire.

July 25 – Reach Out Across Difference

Connect with someone whose background, politics, or worldview differs from yours. Approach with curiosity and grace.

July 26 – Sabbath of the Imagination

Take a break from your usual routines and do something playful or spontaneous. Let your soul breathe.

July 27 – Hope in Scripture

Read 2 Corinthians 4:8–9: "We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed... struck down, but not destroyed." Let this truth steady your heart.

July 28 – Invite Collaboration

Ask someone to join you in a creative or justice-focused act. Hope grows when we don't go it alone.

July 29 – Share a Story

Tell a story—your own or someone else's—that reflects resilience, grace, or redemption. Stories keep hope alive.

July 30 – Pray for Co-Creation

Pray: "God of imagination and justice, shape my heart for your work. Help me co-create a world where all can flourish. Amen."

July 31 – Give Thanks for the Journey

Take time to reflect on how you've grown this month. Give thanks for each step, each effort, each breath of hope.
